Living History Farms Executive Summary

Cultural Connections

Living History Farms connects the rural heritage of Iowa with visitors of all ages and backgrounds; from the local community to visitors from around the globe. Guests travel through time, experiencing a 1700's Ioway Indian farm, an 1850's homestead, an 1875 small town, a 1900's horse-powered farm, and a center of agricultural innovation during the last millennium.

History

Living History Farms was founded by Dr. William G. Murray, agricultural economist from Iowa State University in 1970 who had a passion for educating the public about historic farming practices and how they changed over time. The 600 acre farm was constructed around the Flynn Mansion; a railroad tycoon's home built in 1870. Historic buildings from around Iowa were moved to the site, and others were constructed to create an 1875 town and three historic farms. Of special note, the Pope visited the farms in 1979, drawing the largest public gathering in Iowa's history.

Challenges

As with all non-profit organizations, fundraising is always a challenge. Living History Farms continually offers unique events that appeal to diverse groups of people. The challenge the farms face is in create fundraising events that stay true to their mission.

Much of the work done at the farms is carried out by local volunteers. Recruiting enough quality volunteers and training them continues to take time and effort.

Built on the outskirts of a small Des Moines suburb, the land adjacent to the farms continues to be developed. Modern buildings detract from the atmosphere so new trees have been planted around the perimeter.
